Recollections; 40th Anniversary Celebration for Northeast Metro (MN) Branch

Below you will find the program notes/coverage for the 40th Anniversary: Program—40th Birthday Celebration

After the conclusion of our business meeting, Joni cut and served the delicious anniversary cake. The coffee table was beautifully decorated in ruby red, including a center piece of lovely red roses. Thank you again to the anniversary committee, Linda, LouAnn, Joni, Janet, and Clara, for all they have done to make this celebration a success.

President Vernita opened the program with a welcome to members and guests to the 40th anniversary celebration of the founding of our branch. She promised an evening in which, through table talks and member presentation, we would all share in looking at our many accomplishments during those forty years. LouAnn had sent 93 invitations to past members, and she shared the responses of some who could not come. There were four guests in attendance: Linda A., charter member; Leah Marie, charter member; Karen F., past member; and Barb Wolfe, guest of a member.

Vernita then introduced Jan F., a charter member and first president of the Branch who gave us the history of the organization of the then White Bear Lake Branch of AAUW. One afternoon in early 1976 Jan, Linda A., and Carolyn O. were skiing, three young women with young children who were looking for AAUW without the long night drive into St. Paul and from this afternoon discussion grew the WBL Branch of AAUW. The organizational meeting was held in November 1976, and in January 1977 the branch was formally chartered with 37 members, four of whom—Jan F., Clara G., Christine J., and Louise S.—are still branch members. As the membership grew (at one point to 100 members) spreading out to other communities, the name was changed to Northeast Metro Branch.

Jan then introduced Linda A., the organizer and first editor of <u>The Itanyan</u>, our award-winning newsletter. Linda spoke of some of our history as recorded in the early Itanyans, a Native American word Linda chose for the title of this publication. She also compared the publishing and distribution of these early issues (typewriter and post office) with the computer driven issues of today.

Some of the other histories we discussed:

Someone asked when our first holiday brunch was started. Linda R. replied that our auction fund raiser was first organized in 1984 and held annually in December since then as a Holiday Brunch and Auction, first with an actual auctioneer and later as the Silent Auction which we have now. Linda also recalled several locations we have used in the past. The funds from the auction support our Century College Scholarship, also begun in 1984, as well as other of our projects.

Joni shared an article published in a 1980's <u>Minnesota Pine</u> issue concerning an AAUW Educational Foundation Grant for topic implementation in Taking Hold of Technology awarded to Virginia S. in 1982. Virginia was a member of White Bear Lake Branch. The work she did on this grant may well have led to the technology in place in AAUW today.

LouAnn brought up the Voices and Echoes project which grew from An Important American Woman presentation at every meeting. Interviews of historically important women (impersonated by branch members) were filmed at a local TV studio. Study and discussion questions were developed for each interview, making them suitable for use in schools and other organizations. The Branch received a grant of \$4,000 for this important project. Rachel Carson was the first production, completed in 1991.

Louise S. was not able to attend, but sent a letter about our ESL program at Century College. The program, started in 1984,—a busy year for the branch!—grew to perhaps 25 volunteers on a coordinated schedule supervised by Louise—who also taught in the program! The volunteer teachers and their students often became quite close, planning off-campus activities together.

Doris reminded us of Title IX and our influence on gender equity in 1993, especially in athletics in White Bear Lake schools. A task force met once a month during the school year to review all aspects of Title IX in the White Bear school district. At one point the district suggested making cheerleading a contact sport! A final suggestion we made was that, if the district deleted football or hockey from their program,

they would be in compliance. After consideration, the district added girls' hockey. Doris also spoke about the bullying issues we addressed.

Other highlights of discussion:

- The auto dealer lighting issue
- The Gourmet group, organized 30 years ago to learn about other countries, cultures, and foods
- Book Group organized in 1977
- Investments Club—Joyce gave a thorough explanation of this activity which was organized in 1982 and is still functioning with many of the same members, although not as part of our branch because of AAUW restrictions.

In closing Vernita summarized this review of accomplishments of a relatively small group by saying we should be proud of these things we have done and also inspired by them for future growth of which we are capable.

LouAnn reminded guests and officers to take roses from the centerpiece, and it was time for hugs and personal remembrances.
