Currently Frey is in *CTEP AmeriCorps assigned to the Ramsey County Library System as the Technology Literacy Coordinator. She has focused working in MPIRG (Minnesota Public Interest Research Group) for the social justice committee encouraging young people to vote and engage in their community. She also contributed to the creation of the Augsburg Debate Team. The fall of 2013 she studied abroad in South Korea at Yonsei University where she took Korean history and language courses. In her free time she works as a freelance/independent artist making jewelry and works on commission making costumes and clothing. She specializes in pattern making and design. She enjoys cooking, reading, writing, and crafting. A secret she shared, "I am an avid video gamer."

Women's March Minnesota

Many of you are aware that women will be marching in Washington, DC in a timely way near the inauguaration of President-elect Trump on January 20th. Minnesota will have a solidarity event on January 21st. The sponsors speak of the reasons for the march this way: "Because the rhetoric of the past election cycle has insulted, demonized, and threatened many of us. We will march in numbers too great for administration to ignore on their first day in office. We march and stand together in solidarity with our partners and children for the protection of our rights, our safety, our health, and our families -- recognizing that our vibrant and diverse communities are the strength of our country."

How can you be involved? The gathering begins at 10 a.m. on the John Ireland Blvd. Bridge in front of the Minnesota History Center. Please plan to arrive no later than 10:30. At 11 the march will go north on John Ireland Blvd. toward the Capitol. Arrival at the Capitol should be around 11:30-noon. You may also join in the event by arriving at the Capitol around noon. A rally, including entertainment and speakers will conclude at 2 p.m.

This march is for any person, regardless of gender or gender identity, who believes women's rights are human rights. The team of organizers and volunteers are committed to ensuring that the march reflects women and femme expressive people of all backgrounds. WMM is committed to ensuring that the convening at the capitol is accessible to people with disabilities. There will be an area with seating to accommodate people with disabilities, elderly people and pregnant women. All necessary applications/permits have been filed and the plan is to have tents and heaters at the rally at the Capitol because one never knows about Minnesota weather.

ANNUAL Holiday AUCTION Brunch

On behalf of our branch, many thanks again to Nancy and Christine for co-chairing the Holiday Auction Brunch event and the many others who helped/contributed in so many ways. Sincerely - Vernita Kennen, Branch President

The financial results;

Proceeds for the 2016 brunch and auction were \$1,769.

Costs; Food \$953; Fixed facility room fee \$200; Variable fees that change with other factors are the required tip for staff \$231; sales taxes \$106 = \$1,490

- Hillcrest waived fees at time of invoicing listed in the original contract; bartender \$95; tables \$40; wireless microphone and stand \$100
- NE Metro administrative costs such as supplies and name tags were donated by members

Funds collected; Meals \$1,180; Auction funds and donations collected \$2,079 = \$3,259

We had 59 reservations with 55 in attendance. 75% of those attending purchased auction items or made cash donations making an average donation of over \$50 per person. Brunch at a site like this is not inexpensive; our reservation charge of \$20/person did not cover the expenses and fees for the event. That along with the need for volunteers gives us something to consider as we look forward to plans for 2017.
